# Politics of Decision Making Fellowship: Conflict, Resolution, and Cooperation

Political Leadership Academy Fellows learn from and dialogue with scholarly and practical thought leaders regarding conflict resolution in the American political context. Throughout our 10-week course, we'll cover:

- Strengthening and preserving democracy
- Conflict resolution strategies for collaboration
- Personal and professional communication skills
- · Leadership in public policy

# Who Should Apply?

While those in political leadership roles are especially encouraged to apply, this course is also open to civic and community group members, business and nonprofit leaders, and others interested in conflict resolution in American politics, especially at the Virginia state and local levels.

# What We'll Accomplish

Fellows will be equipped with ideas and skills to respond to contemporary American political conflicts. Sessions will include presentations from scholars and practitioners with an emphasis on group dynamics and networking. Participants will build foundations of understanding from a diverse set of professional and personal backgrounds and will develop contacts with a dynamic cohort of participants who are passionate about unity and problem-solving. Participants will also gain membership in our alumni organization which holds engaging subsequent events exclusively for Political Leadership Academy alumni.
