- SF Sewer System Improvement Project
 - SRF/WIFIA to finance major upgrades at SF's largest wastewater treatment plant over 20 yrs
 - Phase 1 \$2.9 B
 - Gray and green infrastructure
- Workforce gap in mission-critical skilled trades
 - 800 staff needed over next 3-5 yrs
 - Regional collaboration among cities and utilities to provide job training and support services for struggling job seekers through partnerships with community colleges and non-profits.
- Sens. Booker/Capito competitive grant program for water workforce development



Atlanta Bellwood Quarry Event



- Water Supply Program to transform abandoned Bellwood Quarry
 - \$300 million investment
 - Increase water supply from 3 to 30 days
 - Create city's largest public park
 - Improve aging infrastructure
- Key Benefits
 - Climate resilience
 - Supports long-term population growth
 - Protects economic activity of city and regional service area


